
I request every one of you to express your opinion and send the material that is fit to print through e-mail. A job opportunity column, to help our newly graduating fellows will appear in future publications.

IN MEMORIUM MADHUKAR M. DESHMUKH (1929 - 2003)



The death occurred on January 21, 2003, of Dr. Madhukar M. Deshmukh, following a stroke sustained nine days earlier. Dr. Deshmukh had served the A.A.C.I.O. as Editor of its newsletter for the past several years and had been active in the Association in various roles, including that of its President, since its inception about a quarter of a century ago. As member of the Executive Committee, he provided stability and solid guidance to younger members with wise advice and prudent counsel.

Madhukar had ably and meticulously shouldered the burden of editorial duties of the A,A.C.I.O. Newsletter, which are more onerous than might be surmised considering the small size of the publication. As a regular contributor to the Newsletter, I was in touch with Madhukar frequently and have been grateful for his unfailing

courtesy, appreciation and interest in the material sent to him.

Dr. Deshmukh obtained his B.S. and M.B.B.S. degrees in 1950 and 1955 respectively, both from the University of Nagpur, India. He proceeded to the U.S.A. in 1956 and did a Cardiology Fellowship at the Hahneman Medical College Hospital, Philadelphia (1957-59). His next move was to the U. K. where he did senior house officer posts and passed the M.R.C.P. (Edinburgh) in1961. He then returned to India and was

Assistant Honorary Physician at the KEM Hospital and Assistant Professor of Medicine, cardiologist to the Cardiothoracic Surgical team headed by Professor P.K. Sen. Here Madhukar met his wife Sheila who was a radiology member of the team. After five years at KEM Hospital, Madhukar and Sheila headed west to Hammersmith Hospital, London and then Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago, to pursue

a special interest in congenital heart disease.

Back to the U.S.A., Madhukar worked at the St. Barnabas Hospital, Bronx, New York as Director of the Intensive care unit (1971-1982) and he was chief of Cardiology (1980-1983). From 1983 to 2000 he was consultant in Internal Medicine and Cardiology, Health Insurance Plan of New York. In 2000 he returned to academic cardiology with a faculty appointment at Montefiore Medical Center and Albert Einstein College of Medicine, N.Y. He loved teaching housestaff and students and did it very well.

Dr. Deshmukh had boards in Internal Medicine, Cardiology and Critical Care. He was a member of numerous medical societies. Besides the Fellowships of the American College of Cardiology, the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, the American College of Chest Physicians and Council on Geriatric Cardiology, he was a member of the Clinical Council of the American Heart Association, the Heart Failure Society, the Critical Care Society of North America and the American Society of Echocardiography. He was a recipient of the C. L. Jhaveri Prize of the Bombay branch of the Indian Medical Association.

Madhukar was a man of considerable intellect and wide culture, with a broad knowledge of English and Indian literature and a deep fondness for Indian as well as Western classical music. His patients, his present and past colleagues have spoken very highly of his professional abilities, his proficiency as a teacher of clinical cardiology, and warm human qualities that endeared him to all who came to know him well. He was a thorough gentleman and a fine physician in every sense of those words. He is mourned by his wife Dr. Sheila, his son Dr. Ravi a general and vascular surgeon in Chicago, his daughter-in-law Beena and his granddaughters, Mika and Priya.

One of his patients commented "Dr. Deshmukh was not only a fantastic cardiologist, but he was a wonderful human being. He had the right specialty, he had a heart. I cannot express in words how wonderful this man made a patient feel. After leaving his office you

felt like you just left a very good friend."

Madhukar will be missed by all the membership of the AACIO, but the loss will be felt most sharply by us, the seniors of the Association, who shall no longer have his genial yet thoughtful presence beside us at future meetings, who can no longer pick up the phone to ask Madhu what he thinks of some current issue.

Both Dr. Gurpreet Baweja and Dr. Hitinder S. Gurm's abstracts were selected for the AACIO Young Investigator Award and were presented at the AACIO Meeting held during to the AHA meeting in Chicago in November 2002. Both received a plaque and a check for \$1000.00.

Gurpreet Baweja, M.D.



Dr. Baweja received his MBBS degree in 1993 from King Georges' Medical College, Lucknow, which is one of the premier medical schools in India. He was always among the top students in his class and was selected as an Internal Medicine resident at Post Graduate Institute of Medical Education and Research, Chandigarh, one of the most prestigious medical training programs in India. Subsequently, he came to

United States and did Internal Medicine residency training at SUNY-HSC at Brooklyn from 1995-1998. He maintained a high level of academic excellence and scored among top 10 percent of all candidates for the American Board of Internal Medicine certification exam. After finishing residency, Dr Baweja practiced Internal Medicine for three years in a medically undeserved rural community in Georgia as part of his J-1 visa waiver requirement.

To further his interest in the field of cardiology, Dr Baweja joined as clinical echocardiography fellow under Dr Navin Nanda in the division of cardiovascular diseases at University of Alabama at Birmingham in June 2002. He is currently receiving extensive training in all the aspects of the cardiac ultrasound including TTE, TEE, transpharyngeal echocardiography, stress, contrast, 3-D echo, tissue Doppler imaging and vascular ultrasound. He is involved in research projects on wide range of subjects like 3-D echo,

transpharyngeal echocardiography, brachial artery reactivity and clinical epidemiology. He is the principal author of three research papers and co-author of several others. He is currently pursuing for cardiology fellowship and wish to have an academic career in the field of cardiovascular imaging.

Hitinder S. Gurm, M.B.B.S.



Hitinder S Gurm was born and brought up in Ludhiana, Punjab. He went to Christian Medical College and graduated in 1992. He subsequently went to UK for further training and after working in Scotland for a year moved to Crewe for a rotational position in internal medicine. He obtained his MRCP in 1995 and moved to USA the following year having realized the futility of chasing professional excellence in the pyramidal

structure of the NHS. He did his residency in Internal medicine at the Cleveland Clinic and was selected to be the chief resident for the year 1999-2000. He subsequently joined the cardiology fellowship at the Cleveland clinic under Dr Topol and is currently in his final year. He will be joining the interventional cardiology fellowship program at the Cleveland Clinic in July 2003.
